HLF and the Centenary

- Over £90million awarded to more than 1,800 projects
- Projects are:
 - Telling a range of stories
 - Recording and conserving First
 World War heritage
 - Engaging people with heritage for the first time
 - Enabling communities to explore how the war is relevant to their lives today



Funding available

- Funding is available for projects of all sizes <u>throughout</u> the Centenary
- Projects need to be led by a not-for-profit organisation
- 4 grants programmes:
 - First World War: then and now (£3,000 £10,000)
 - Our Heritage(£10,000 £100,000)
 - Young Roots (aimed at 11 25 yr olds)
 (£10,000 £50,000
 - <u>Heritage Grants</u> (£100,000 +)



What does a good application look like?

You will need to tell us:

- What difference you want to make (which HLF 'outcomes' you will achieve)
- What First World War heritage your project will focus on
- What you will do and how you will involve people in your project
- How you will share what you have done with other people



What do projects need to achieve?

Heritage will be ...

- better managed
- in better condition
- better interpreted and explained
- identified/recorded

People will have...

- learnt about heritage
- developed skills
- changed their attitudes and/or behaviour
- had an enjoyable experience
- volunteered time

Communities

more people and a wider range of people will have engaged with heritage



Heritage focus

- Local places
- Objects, photographs, documents and newspapers
- Individuals and communities affected by the war
- Buildings and structures e.g. factories and hospitals
- War memorials
- Recordings of memories
- Memories of people affected by the war after it happened
- Art, literature, music, theatre, film and popular culture
- Anything created during or since the war that shows its impact on the UK and people currently living here

What will you do?

- Visits to places
- Using collections
- Talking to people
- Recording things
- Undertaking physical works
- tell us who will be involved in carrying out the activities.
- Will they need any training?



How will you share what you have done with other people?

- Community events
- Celebrating your project's achievements
- Digital things like a smartphone app, DVD or website
- Exhibitions
- Guides/trails
- Leaflets or books
- Packs for schools
- Performances
- Events for professionals

Who do you plan to share with?
